REPORT OF THE CHAIRPERSON

for the financial year ended 31 December 2023

During 2023, it was my privilege to take up the role of chairperson of The Alfred Beit Foundation upon the retirement of Judith Woodworth in September 2023. The Alfred Beit Foundation, established in 1976 as a registered charity by Sir Alfred and Lady Clementine Beit, is entrusted with the development, management and care of Russborough.

In 2023, The Alfred Beit Foundation saw significant strides in growth and development as we initiated a new strategic plan for the period 2023-2028. This plan is driven by our mission to advance education in the fine arts for the benefit of the public together with the long-term preservation of Russborough, its art collections, gardens and parklands. Following a process of wide stakeholder engagement, the strategy provides a clear direction forward for Russborough and it is acknowledged that all projects and workplans emerging from the strategy will involve significant investment from both private and public sources.

Throughout the year, Russborough made great progress towards becoming one of Ireland's most recognised country house museums and was voted amongst the top 10% of attractions worldwide by Travellers Choice. The Vernet Drawing Room, having been meticulously restored in the first part of the year, was unveiled in June and is the only one of its kind in Ireland to house the original works it was designed for. We are most grateful to The Apollo Foundation who supported this project which allows the unique vision for the room to be reinstated.

With support from LEADER via the Co Wicklow Partnership, The Alfred Beit Foundation launched its specially commissioned Conservation Management Plan for the Parkland at Russborough. The all-encompassing report, undertaken by historic experts Christopher Gallagher and Dr. Sarah Rutherford, involved extensive analysis of the extant features at Russborough and concluded that Richard Castle laid out the landscape design of formal terraces and canals informed by the writing of Stephen Switzer. This new finding has research implications for a number of other Irish sites and propels the significance of the Russborough landscape into that of international importance. Launched in February by then Minister Simon Harris, Russborough was crowned a "cultural destination of international significance" which is a wonderful recognition of Ireland's foremost Palladian architect and engineer, Richard Castle.

Having been awarded considerable grant income of €198,000 by Wicklow County Council under the Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Fund in late 2022, we began the process of project scoping to upgrade the estate pathways and to make other necessary corrections to the parkland. Enhancements completed within the year included the complete restoration of the park rail to the front of the house.

Our commitment to community engagement remained steadfast, marked by a series of events tailored to welcome our local visitors. Russborough played host to two charity cycle events, vintage car exhibitions, educational talks, an adventure hunt at Easter, weekly Parkrun events and regular Blessington RFC training and match play events.

Larger events such as Kaleidoscope, the annual RHSI Russborough Garden Show, the Car Boot Art Fair, the Dark Maze, the West Wicklow Festivals and our extensive Christmas programme all contributed towards driving footfall to the Estate.

A new food and beverage contractor was appointed in September 2023 to operate the café business. Gather and Gather share The Alfred Beit Foundation's ambitions to bring excellent quality food to our visitors whilst taking a sustainable approach to the sourcing, preparation and presentation of food and services.

The assumption across the Tourism industry was that travel and tourism would revert to 2019 levels by 2023, however a number of factors resulted in this not being the case. Despite our best efforts to recruit more visitors, the environment in which we operated was fraught with challenges. The decrease in business for the domestic market was largely due to the resurgence of Irish holidaymakers choosing to travel abroad again. This was coupled with a lack of tourist accommodation which had a major impact on both the overseas and the domestic markets. Therefore during 2023, we again found ourselves in the situation whereby visitor numbers remained depressed whilst costs such as energy, labour and materials continued to increase dramatically.

Despite these challenges, we approach the next year with a profound sense of optimism. Significant progress was made in 2023, and both the board of directors and the Executive team eagerly anticipate the implementation of our new strategy over the coming years.

Once again, we are deeply grateful for The Apollo Foundation's continued financial support to The Alfred Beit Foundation and our programme of on-going works. We are also very thankful to our supporters including Amanda Pratt, who continued to work closely with the Foundation in providing her retail excellence, and to the Irish Georgian Society and Sheehan and Barry who supported the Vernet Drawing Room project.

As chairperson, I want to extend huge thanks to the entire Russborough team for their outstanding dedication and hard

work throughout the year. The success and contributions of Russborough are a testament to their commitment.

Finally, I would like to extend my heartfelt appreciation to Judith Woodworth for her remarkable leadership throughout her eight- year tenure as Chairperson of The Alfred Beit Foundation. Judith exemplified professionalism in her role and her unwavering dedication to the organisation set a commendable standard.

The Board of Directors are pleased to present their annual Directors' Report together with the audited financial statements of The Alfred Beit Foundation for the year ended 31 December 2023. This report presents the information and disclosures required by a Directors' Report under the Companies Act 2014, together with additional information required by the Charities Statement of Recommended Practice ("SORP") applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (second edition effective 1 January 2019). The company is compliant with the Charities Governance Code.

WHO WE ARE

The Alfred Beit Foundation ("ABF") is a company limited by guarantee, not having a share capital, incorporated in Ireland in 1976 under the Companies Act with registration No. 54656. Every member of The Alfred Beit Foundation undertakes, if necessary on a winding up during the time they are a member or within one year after they cease to be a member, to contribute to the assets of the Foundation an amount not exceeding €1.27. The Alfred Beit Foundation's governing document is its Constitution.

Under licence from the Minister for Industry and Commerce dated 1976, The Alfred Beit Foundation is exempt from including 'limited' in its name.

The Alfred Beit Foundation is a charity registered with the Charities Regulatory Authority with a registered number of 20009816 and has been granted tax exemption by the Revenue Commissioners in Ireland, with registered charitable taxation No: CHY 5940. As a charity the Alfred Beit Foundation is a public benefit entity.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Board of Directors consists of six Directors nominated by six named bodies in the Constitution and a maximum of five independent Directors plus an independent Chairperson.

Organisational Structure

The Board of Directors is responsible for providing leadership, setting strategy and ensuring control. Day-to-day operations of the organisation are managed by the Chief Executive who is appointed by the Board. The Alfred Beit Foundation employs the expertise of external consultants where required.

The Directors are committed to maintaining the highest standards of Corporate Governance and they believe that this is a key element in ensuring the proper operation of The Alfred Beit Foundation's activities. A core element of this policy is to ensure that the Foundation is led by an effective Board of Directors and an experienced Chief Executive. The roles of Chairperson and Chief Executive are separate, and all members of the Board are independent of the management of The Alfred Beit Foundation.

Committees of the Board of Directors

There is a clear division of roles and responsibilities at The Alfred Beit Foundation. The Board of Directors retains responsibility for strategy, policy and control of major decisions under a formal schedule of matters and delegates authority to the Chief Executive for the day to day management of operations.

The committee also reports to the Board of Directors on the key risks impacting on The Alfred Beit Foundation and on strategies to minimise identified risks. In addition, the committee makes a recommendation to the Board of Directors on the appointment or re-appointment of the auditors.

All members of the Board of Directors give of their time freely and no Board member received remuneration in the year.

The pay of the Chief Executive is reviewed annually by the Board on the recommendation of its Business and Finance committee, while the pay of the other staff members is reviewed by the Chief Executive in consultation with the Business and Finance committee. Given the nature of the Foundation, the Board of Directors benchmark against pay levels in other non-profit organisations.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The objectives of The Alfred Beit Foundation are the promotion of the advancement of education in the fine arts in Ireland for the benefit of the public together with the long-term preservation of Russborough, its art collections, gardens and parklands.

In order to achieve these objectives, Russborough can be viewed as three different areas each of which are unique but which are designed to complement each other. These are:

Russborough House

At the heart of Russborough is the house, a 280 year-old Palladian mansion, presenting the best aspects of an Irish country house to visitors through a wonderful, guided tour provided by expert local guides. The house also provides a fitting and suitable venue for appropriate arts, cultural and educational events.

Visitor facilities area

Surrounding the house is an area comprising a significant visitor attraction in its own right but also generating revenues while limiting the wear and tear on the house. This visitor facilities area includes the many outbuildings, courtyards and grassed areas providing a range of attractions including artisan crafts, specialist activities such as falconry, the playground and the 20,000 square feet, head high, beech hedge maze as well as facilitating family events, concerts, catering and retail.

The Parklands Area

The remainder of the demesne is the Parklands Area. It provides various attractions for visitors including parkland walks and trails, the original 18th century walled garden and a woodland rhododendron walk.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

With a relatively new Senior Management Team, the ABF focussed on balancing improvements in the House with improvements throughout the park. The reinstated Vernet Drawing Room launched in June and attracted a new cohort of visitors resulting in a peak in numbers during the summer months. The resulting PR coverage across numerous media greatly helped with the ongoing promotion of Russborough.

The appointment of the Head Gardener in late 2022 reaped rewards throughout 2023. Significant enhancements have been made to the Estate in line with the Conservation Management Plan which was launched by then Minister Simon Harris in early Spring. Improvements include a major clean-up of the Avenue, removal of invasive species on the Estate, cutting of the 2km maze beech hedge and a water conservation project which resulted in reducing the water usage level from 30,000 litres per day to 6,000 litres per day.

Visitor numbers have steadily increased from 2022 levels to approximately 26,500 visitors during 2023 (up from 24,730) however this figure still lags behind pre-Covid visitor numbers in 2019 (32,500). This is partly due to the overhang from Covid whereby domestic visitors chose to holiday abroad coupled with issues around the lack of tourist accommodation at home.

Towards the end of 2022, our café contract was terminated with Love Food. Due to the timing of new contractors, the ABF decided to operate the café in house from February – September 2023. Gather and Gather were appointed the new café contractors and began operations September 2023.

Although income from the Gift Shop was lower than in the previous year, the shop itself continued to attract positive attention and PR.

The Apollo Foundation continued their support and contributed significantly to the repairs and maintenance of the House during 2023. We are extremely grateful to them for the ongoing support.

There were challenges in the year including lack of gardening equipment, end of life catering equipment and security equipment which put a strain on our expenditure budget. Cashflow continues to prove challenging particularly in the shoulder months of January to April and October to December. Staff recruitment and retention remains challenging due to our semi-rural location and this will most likely remain an on-going issue.

A new five year strategic plan was adopted by the Board which will provide a solid framework for the ABF over the coming years. The plan identifies clear objectives and will be measured and monitored using the OKR methodology.

During 2023, we further expanded our Senior Management Team by appointing a Sales and Business Development Manager and an Events Manager; both roles are income generating. This is an important step in building a strong and cohesive team to lead the Foundation into the next phase of work.

Great credit is due to the small, but hard-working and committed team who continue to work to raise the profile of Russborough.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Results

House and estate income of €1,962,856 (2022: €1,618,179) included significant investment income of €327,599 (2022: €339,559). Income from grants remained important however decreased significantly to €40,648 (2022: €124,182) and with Apollo grant aid totalling €258,876 (2022: €289,192). In particular, The Apollo Foundation grants provided critical financial support for day to day operations particularly in the context of ever increasing energy and other costs. During 2023, we also secured funding from the Night Time Economy and the National Parks Wildlife Scheme.

Following on from a very turbulent 2022, the investment portfolio gained back the unrealised losses from 2022 and gained in value. This movement during 2023 was in line with similar investment funds and the endowment funds remain in line with market trends.

Due to significant on-going cashflow issues during 2022, the Directors took the difficult decision to drawdown €250,000 from the Endowment Funds during 2023, this was to enable the Executive to run the day to day operations of the Foundation more efficiently. The drawdown is intended as a temporary loan and when the income conditions improve to a satisfactory level, the Directors have affirmed that the money will be transferred back to the Endowment Funds.

Reserves

The Alfred Beit Foundation defines its reserves as its Total Funds on the Balance Sheet on page 20 and they total €11,772,058 (2022 : €11,925,147). These funds can be used for any of its charitable purposes.

Operational risk management

The Directors consider annually the major risks to which The Alfred Beit Foundation is exposed. They have identified one major risk and their mitigation strategies are identified below:

Future levels of income

Currently the ABF is heavily reliant on donations and income from visitors to allow it to meet its financial requirements. Our 5 year strategic plan provides a road map for the Senior Management team to work through in order to diversify our income. The ABF are currently seeking funding from a number of different sources including Government grants, Philanthropic donations and commercial activities.

Progress has been made under the Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme and the railings to the front of the House have now been restored. Upgrade to the pathways surrounding the Estate are due to commence in Q2 of 2024 and these pathways will link up with the proposed Greenway which is due for completion during 2025.

The Directors mitigate the risk that income will fall by engaging with its major benefactor, The Apollo Foundation, to ensure that funding targets are achieved; by meeting at regular intervals with its two independent fund managers, Quilter Cheviot Europe Limited and Brewin Dolphin Ireland, in order to review investment fund strategy and by continually reviewing its offering to the general public to ensure it continues to attract significant visitor numbers.

Financial risk management objectives and policies

The Alfred Beit Foundation's activities expose it to a number of financial risks including credit risk and liquidity risk. Given the type and scale of the Foundation's activities, these risks are lower than would occur in a commercial environment.

Credit risk

The Foundation's principal financial assets are investments, bank balances, cash and receivables. The Alfred Beit Foundation's credit risk is primarily attributable to its liquid funds and is limited because the counterparties are banks with high credit-ratings assigned by international credit rating agencies with deposits insured in accordance with EU regulations.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Foundation will be unable to meet financial commitments arising from the cash flows generated by its activities. The risk can arise from mismatches in the timing of cash flows relating to assets and liabilities. The Foundation's liquidity is managed by ensuring that sufficient cash and deposits are held on short notice, and by retaining sufficient reserves to cover short term fluctuations in income. The Foundation's reserve policies are to ensure that sufficient funds are available for ongoing operations and future developments.

Endowment Fund risk

A significant proportion of the liquid assets of the Foundation are independently managed by two professional fund managers, being Quilter Cheviot Europe Limited and RBC Brewin Dolphin Ireland. As evidenced by the international stock market volatility over the years there is a risk that the value of these investments can reduce substantially in the short term. However, the Foundation's investment strategy is to invest for the long term over a diverse range of investment securities and historical evidence suggests that there is a much reduced risk to these investment funds during the longer term horizon. The Fund Managers employed by the ABF incorporate environmental, social and governance (ESG) factors into investment decisions and active ownership. The RBC Brewin Dolphin investment team addresses ESG issues in due diligence for all investments. Similarly, Quilter Cheviot integrates into their research process and portfolio construction a variety of mechanisms and procedures that incorporate being a responsible investor, to help generate a sustainable future.

PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

Our 5-year Strategic Plan was formally adopted by the Board during 2023. The plan provides a clear direction forward with a strong emphasis on securing a sustainable future for Russborough. The Senior Management team will continue to work to maximise commercial income streams whilst the CEO and Directors will explore other funding opportunities such as State funding and private philanthropic funding.

We are committed to a sustainable future and, as we advance our strategy, we will work with our staff, visitors, commercial partners and funders to minimise our energy footprint – seeking out green and carbon-neutral solutions where-ever possible. We are currently developing a Sustainable Strategy aiming for Zero to Landfill Waste by World Earth Day in April 2024.

Following on from our Digital that Delivers grant from Failte Ireland, we are re-developing our website to improve the visitor experience and to add enhancement features.

The curatorial and education committee of the Board of Directors plans to enhance the education offerings of the Foundation so that it may better fulfil the wishes of Sir Alfred and Lady Beit in promoting education in the arts. Funding permitting, we also intend to recruit an Assistant Curator to support the increased focus on educational programming.

The Sales and Business Development Manager and Events Manager continue to focus on generating income from fundraising activities in order to underpin the following four major projects;

- Promoting education in the arts
- Restoring and renting Irish built heritage properties on the estate
- Developing and implementing curatorial, conservation and museum accreditation practices
 Maintaining Irish built heritage in terms of the 280 year-old Palladian Mansion at the centre of the Russborough estate

INTERNAL CONTROLS

The Directors acknowledge their overall responsibility for The Alfred Beit Foundation's systems of internal control and for reviewing its effectiveness. They have delegated responsibility for the implementation of this system to the Chief Executive. This system includes financial controls, which enable the Board to meet its responsibilities for the integrity and accuracy of The Alfred Beit Foundation's accounting records.

The Board has established a process of compliance which addresses the Board's wider responsibility to maintain, review and report on all internal controls, including financial and operational.

Key elements of internal control systems:

- The Alfred Beit Foundation has strict policies and procedures in place for the receipt, recording and control of donations received from private individuals and the corporate sector;
- There is a formal organisational structure in place with clearly defined lines of responsibility, division of duties and delegation of authority;

- A detailed budget is prepared annually which is in line with the strategic plan and approved by the Board. Actual
 results and service outcomes are compared regularly against budget and prior year to ensure alignment with budget,
 tight administration control and value for money;
- The Audit and Risk Committee reports independently to the Board of Directors on all aspects of controls and risks;
- The Board maintains a reserve policy to mitigate the increasing risks of the uncertain economy and to ensure sustainability of services.

FUNDRAISING

The Alfred Beit Foundation is fully committed to achieving the standards contained within the Statement of Guiding Principles for Fundraising. The Statement exists to:

- · Improve fundraising practice;
- · Promote high levels of accountability and transparency by organisations fundraising from the public;
- Provide clarity and assurances to donors and prospective donors about the organisations they support;

POST BALANCE SHEET EVENTS

A market value of €8,363,481 was obtained for the current asset investments as at 31 March 2024. This represents an increase in value of €238,210 or 2.9% since the year end. These investments are independently managed for the long term benefit of the Foundation and fluctuate in line with market conditions.

There have been no other significant events affecting the company since the financial year-end.

ACCOUNTING RECORDS

The Directors acknowledge their responsibilities under Section 281 to 285 of the Companies Act 2014 to keep adequate accounting records for the Foundation. In order to comply with the requirements of the Act, appropriate personnel are employed. The accounting records of the Foundation are kept at its registered office and principal place of business, Russborough, Blessington, Co Wicklow, W91 W284.

GOING CONCERN

The Directors are engaging in a campaign to ensure that sufficient long-term investment funds are available so that the investment income generated on an annual basis can be applied to any operational deficits. While this process is not complete at the year end, significant progress has been made that has resulted in investment funds standing at €8,363,481 at 31 March 2024. Accordingly, the Board has concluded that there is a reasonable expectation that there are adequate resources to meet the liabilities of the Foundation as they fall due for the foreseeable future.

COMPLIANCE WITH SECTOR-WIDE LEGISLATION AND STANDARDS

The charity engages pro-actively with legislation, standards and codes which are developed for the sector. The Alfred Beit Foundation (A Company Limited by Guarantee not having a share capital) subscribes to and is compliant with the following:

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

The Alfred Beit Foundation (A Company Limited by Guarantee not having a share capital) is a company incorporated in Ireland. The registered office of the charity is Russborough, Blessington, Co. Wicklow which is also the principal place of business of the charity. The financial statements have been presented in Euro (€) which is also the functional currency of the charity.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the charity's financial statements.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102".

The charity has applied the Charities SORP on a voluntary basis as its application is not a requirement of the current regulations for charities registered in the Republic of Ireland. As permitted by the Companies Act 2014, the charity has varied the standard formats in that act for the Statement of Financial Activities and the Balance Sheet. Departures from the standard formats, as outlined in the Companies Act 2014, are to comply with the requirements of the Charities SORP and are in compliance with section 4.7, 10.6 and 15.2 of that SORP.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the charity for the financial year ended 31 December 2023 have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland FRS 102".

Fund accounting

The following are the categories of funds maintained:

Restricted funds

Restricted funds represent income received which can only be used for particular purposes, as specified by the donors. Such purposes are within the overall objectives of the charity.

Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds consist of General and Designated funds.

- General funds represent amounts which are expendable at the discretion of the board, in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.
- Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that the board has, at its discretion, set aside for particular purposes. These designations have an administrative purpose only, and do not legally restrict the board's discretion to apply the fund.

Income

Income is recognised by inclusion in the Statement of Financial Activities only when the charity is legally entitled to the income, performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, the amounts involved can be measured with sufficient reliability and it is probable that the income will be received by the charity.

Donations and legacies

Donations and legacies include all income received by The Alfred Beit Foundation that is, in substance, a gift made to the Foundation on a voluntary basis. It is accounted for when there is evidence of entitlement, receipt is probable, and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from charitable activities

Income from charitable activities includes house and estate generated income, and income received as grants for specific purposes. Income from government and other co-funders is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to the income because it is fulfilling the conditions contained in the related funding agreements. Where a grant is received in advance, its recognition is deferred and included in creditors. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, it is accrued in debtors.

Grants from governments and other co-funders typically include one of the following types of conditions:

- Performance based conditions: whereby the charity is contractually entitled to funding only to the extent that the core objectives of the grant agreement are achieved. Where the charity is meeting the core objectives of a grant agreement, it recognises the related expenditure, to the extent that it is reimbursable by the donor, as income.
- -Time based conditions: whereby the charity is contractually entitled to funding on the condition that it is utilised in a particular period. In these cases the charity recognises the income to the extent it is utilised within the period specified in the agreement.

In the absence of such conditions, assuming that receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured, grant income is recognised once the charity is notified of entitlement.

Grants received towards capital expenditure are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities when received or receivable, whichever is earlier.

Expenditure

Resources expended are analysed as charitable activities. Expenditure on charitable activities is accounted for on an accrual basis, and includes all costs incurred by The Alfred Beit Foundation in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims, including those support costs and costs relating to governance of the Foundation.

Investment Income

Investment Income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities in the financial year that it is receivable. Investment income includes income received on endowment fund investments held by The Alfred Beit Foundation and income from any other deposits.

Employee Benefits

The company provides short term benefits for employees, including holiday pay and other similar non-monetary benefits. The benefits are recognised as an expense in the period in which the service is received.

Heritage Assets

It is considered appropriate to value the property at historic cost in the financial statements in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102 (FRS 102) Section 34.

Other heritage assets of historical and artistic significance, comprising the various collections on display in the house are not being valued for security reasons. They are not held for investments and The Alfred Beit Foundation does not actively seek to acquire or dispose of these assets.

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost or at valuation, less accumulated depreciation. The charge to depreciation is calculated to write off the original cost or valuation of tangible fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives as follows:

a) Tangible assets:

Fixtures, fittings and equipment

5 to 20 years

Tractor

10 years

b) Heritage assets:

Land and buildings freehold

20 to 50 years

Leasing and Hire Purchases

Tangible fixed assets held under leasing arrangements which transfer substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership to the charity are capitalised and included in the balance sheet at their cost or valuation, less depreciation. The corresponding commitments are recorded as liabilities. Payments in respect of these obligations are treated as consisting of capital and interest elements, with interest charged to the income and expenditure account.

Investments

Current asset investments are initially recognised at cost and subsequently at fair value. Market valuations provided by the Foundation's independent Investment Managers are deemed by the Directors to be the fair value at the balance sheet date. Unrealised gains and losses are taken to the Statement of Financial Activities on revaluation of the Investment each financial end.

Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and estimated selling price less costs to complete and sell. Cost comprises expenditure incurred in the normal course of business in bringing inventories to their present location and condition. Provision is made for obsolete and slow-moving items. Net realisable value comprises actual or estimated selling price (net of trade discounts) less all further costs to be incurred in marketing and selling. Inventory is recognised when all risks and rewards have transferred to the company.

Debtors

Debtors are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently at amortised cost less any impairment losses. Trade debtors are considered for impairment on an ongoing basis. Provisions for impairment of trade debtors balances are recorded against identified doubtful debtors. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due. Income recognised by the charity from government agencies and other co-founders, but not yet received at financial year end, is included in debtors.

Creditors

Creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. Creditors are classified within creditors falling due within one year if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented within creditors falling due in greater than one year.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand comprises cash on deposit at banks requiring less than three months' notice of withdrawal.

Taxation and deferred taxation

No Current or deferred taxation arises as the Foundation is recognised by the Revenue Commissioners as a body established for charitable purposes only and as such qualifies for the exemptions available under Section 207 of the Taxes Consolidation Act, 1997. The registered charity number is CHY5940.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS AND KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

In the application of the Foundation's accounting policies, the Board are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying value of assets and liabilities that are not readily available from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors which are considered relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The following are critical judgements that the Board have made in the process of applying the organisation's accounting policies and that have the most significant effect on the amounts carries in the financial statements:

a) Tangible Fixed Assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is calculate based on the Board's estimate of the useful life of each category of fixed asset. The Board has noted that there is a difference between the value of the property for insurance purposes, and historic cost. The Board considers that this policy is appropriate.

b) Heritage Assets

Heritage assets comprising the various collections on display in the house are not valued, and the Board

considers this to be appropriate for security reasons.

c) Stock

Retail stock is included in the financial statements at cost price. The Board has noted that there are no material differences between the replacement cost of stock and the balance sheet amounts.

4. GOING CONCERN

The financial statements of The Alfred Beit Foundation are prepared on a going concern basis. The Directors, having made enquiries, have a reasonable expectation that the Foundation has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future.

5. PROVISIONS AVAILABLE FOR AUDITS OF SMALL ENTITIES

In common with many other charity of our size and nature, we use our auditors to assist with the preparation of the financial statements.

22. STATUS

The Foundation was incorporated on 23 March 1976 as a company limited by guarantee not having a share capital.

The liability of the members is limited.

Every member of the company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the company in the event of its being wound up while they are members, or within one financial year thereafter, for the payment of the debts and liabilities of the company contracted before they ceased to be members, and the costs, charges and expenses of winding up, and for the adjustment of the rights of the contributors among themselves, such amount as may be required, not exceeding €1.27

23. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

All members of the Board of Directors give their time freely and no Board member received remuneration during the year.

No member of the Board of Directors or other person related to the Charity had any personal interest in any contract or transaction entered into by the Charity during the year, or the comparative year 2022.

The Chief Executive Officer is required to reside in an apartment on the grounds of Russborough House under the terms of a caretaker's agreement, with no rent payable. This apartment was formerly rented on the open market for approximately €23,000 per annum.

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25. POST-BALANCE SHEET EVENTS

A market value of €8,363,481 was obtained for the current asset investments as at 31 March 2024. This represents an uplift in value of €238,210, or 2.9%, since the year end. These investments are independently managed for the long-term benefit of the Foundation and fluctuate in line with market conditions.

There have been no other significant events affecting the Charity since the financial year-end.

26. SECURITY

The Heritage Council of Rothe House, Kilkenny, holds a charge, expiring 18 May 2023 on the property at Russborough for all money and liabilities, to the value of €1,500,000, which are now or shall for the time being be due or incurred to The Heritage Council by the Foundation whether solely or jointly.

The National Tourism Development Authority of 88-95 Amiens Street, Dublin 1, holds a charge, expiring December 2026, on the property at Russborough for all money and liabilities, to the value of €1,219,094, which are now or shall for the time being be due or incurred to the Heritage Council by the Foundation whether solely or jointly.

The Department of Tourism Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media have requested a Deed of Charge for present and future advances, over The Alfred Beit Foundation's interest in Russborough House and Parklands to the value of €417,500 for a period of 15 years. This is in respect of the grant aid of €55,883 approved by the Department during 2021 and other grants awarded and recognised in previous years.
